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Everyday I become more enamored [with the quality and availability of the information being provided to us from Washington](#). Because of the diversity and the richness of the media that we have in this country, I will never fear that I have missed out on something important. At almost any moment, I can easily review or replay a print release, an audio broadcast or a video event over the Internet, in its entirety, to review the facts and learn exactly what has happened.
